



## Chapter 5

### Lake Como

#### THE RATIONAL OF AN ASSASSINATION

Every age of man has suffered its own brutal assassinations and has its own sorrowful martyrology, some reaching into the thousands of recorded names that can be read in the various histories of man. Men and women have suffered this unwilled death sentence at the hands of others due mainly to their closely held beliefs, convictions and ideology. To this list of historical names, tens of thousands of unnamed and unknown martyrs can be added, most mainly due to those who have suffered and died because of someone else's ideas and concepts manifest in an ongoing series of wars – known and celebrated or unknown and unremembered both are martyrs.

To the list of assassination history the name of Benito Mussolini may now be added. He was assassinated in cold blood by a series of bullet wounds on April 28, 1945 at 4:10 p.m. at the Lake Como village of Guilino di Mezzegra, Italy. He was assassinated because of the ideals he held dear and absolute and by the order of the international secret International Organizations that represented other minds and men that held diametrically opposing values to those practiced by his twenty-three year Italian Fascist Regime. Mussolini's applied religious, economic and social governmental programs were not to their liking and most certainly not to their economic or political benefit.

In company with Socrates of Athens, and Sts. Peter and Paul of Rome, and Sts. Thomas More and Becket of London and the four Religious women raped and murdered in 1980 in Guatemala, Mussolini accepted his death as his life's final fulfillment of a lifetime of service and dedication to his flock the Italian People, whom he loved with unending admiration, respect and gratitude.

Caught in an irretractable web of international intrigues, political duplicity, and secret society treachery and treason, he like so many other heroic men and women in history, faced death that afternoon standing against the stone wall at the gate of the Villa Belmonte. One tragedy in the scandalous historical affairs we now speak of as the Second World War which created martyrs of fifty-five million unnamed men, women, children, and soldiers.

These martyrs were the soldiers and civilians of Russia (18 million dead), Germany ( 4.2 million dead), Italy (.4 Million), Poland (5.8 million), U.K. and Commonwealth ( 1 million), U.S.A. (.3 million), Japan ( 2 million ) and a host of other nations suffering lesser deaths.
